Community groups in need have support to deliver services to Peel residents





Core Service

- Mitigating Poverty in Peel by bringing together community agencies to implement the Peel Poverty Reduction Strategy and working collaboratively to improve the wellbeing of Peel's most vulnerable residents
- Invest in the Peel Not for Profit sector (NFP) by providing \$11.4M in funding in 2023 to address the needs of marginalized, and equity-seeking populations, tackling complex social challenges.
- Lead efforts in prevention, intervention and housing for Peel's Anti-Human Sex Trafficking Program
- Co-lead the local immigration partnerships, coordinating immigration and refugee settlement with the **Peel Newcomer Strategy Group** that includes over 200 local service providers.

For the first time in Peel, Black-led, Blackfocused, and Blackserving agencies have access to dedicated funds to address historical funding inequities and capacity challenges experienced by Peel's Black communities

Supporting Refugees through Settlement Services

Supported asylum claimants in Peel's shelter system by convening settlement services to provide culturally appropriate services and supports

Supporting the Metamorphosis Network

Provided support to the Metamorphosis Network in the delivery of its funding analysis, highlighting the critical need to address provincial funding gaps in Peel

Launch of Peel's first Lived Experience Remuneration Framework

Region-wide framework to equitably compensate people with lived experience while ensuring their voices are at the center of programming and service delivery

Service levels and trends

\$1000 in 2022 = \$915 in 2024

Declining real value of money due to inflation and higher interest rates \$578

Less annually per person in provincial funding provided to residents of Peel when compared to residents of other Ontario municipalities 60% to 80%

Increase in food bank use in Peel with 30% being first time users of food banks 141%

Increase in the number of HT victims/survivors who accessed services and supports at the integrated services hub when compared to 2022

Business plan outlook

Planning for the future

- Drive solutions that can mitigate the impacts of poverty in Peel
- Coordinate a systems response to increased immigration and refugees in Peel
- Advocate for resources and greater coordination for Anti-Human Sex Trafficking supports
- Strengthen investment and capacity due to increased demands on NFP's in Peel
- Continue to convene and develop strategies that leverage the broader community sector

Performance measures and results

Investing in Peel Non for Profits

- \$11.4M invested through 195 agency contracts; \$2.7M allocated in partnership with OW to support wellness response
- 33% new NFP's funded, an increase of 21% from last year
- Investing in equityseeking groups; 20% funding provided to Black, Indigenous NFP's (target 10%)

Anti-Human Sex Trafficking Strategy

- 372 Regional frontline staff received AHST training in 2023, an increase of 27% from last year
- Increase in clients with complex needs at the Safe and Transition Houses with a 58% increase in number of safety plans completed at the Safe House and a 33% increase at the Transition House

Poverty Mitigation

- Through community tables supported by the Peel Poverty Reduction Committee representatives from over 80 organizations meet monthly to address poverty in Peel
- 5,960 residents enrolled in the Affordable Transit Program, a 27% increase from last year

Community Engagement

- 3 Lived Experience community consultations held to improve services and mitigate the impacts of poverty for lowincome residents in Peel
- Over 100 agencies meet weekly to discuss settlement surges and coordinated access to housing, employment, and social supports.

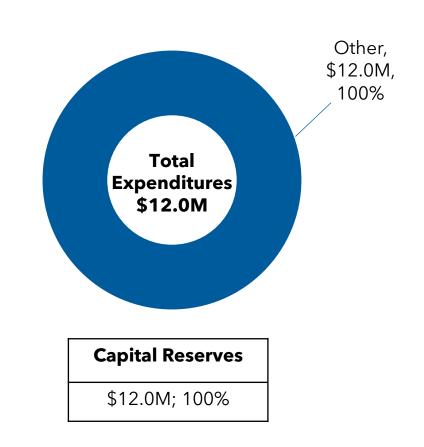

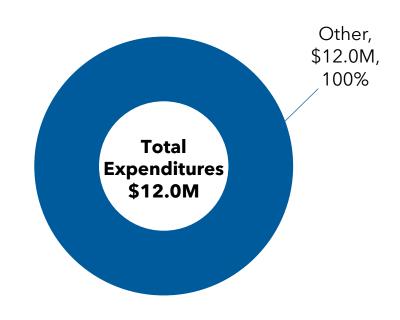
