#### RECOMMENDATION

That the advocacy approach described in the report of the Acting Commissioner of Corporate Services, titled "2018 Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) Annual Conference," be endorsed.

#### REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- The 2018 AMO Conference will take place August 19 22 in Ottawa.
- This year's conference may provide the first major opportunity following the provincial election for Regional Councillors to meet with Ministers, Parliamentary Assistants, opposition party leaders and senior provincial staff.
- Regional staff will request delegations with provincial ministers with the goal of advancing Regional Council's advocacy priorities.

#### **DISCUSSION**

#### 1. Background

The AMO Annual Conference (Conference) will take place August 19 - 22, 2018 in Ottawa.

Over the past several years, the AMO Annual Conference has included keynote addresses by provincial party leaders and cabinet ministers. Previous Conferences have also included a Ministers' Forum where cabinet ministers answered questions from Conference participants. Another traditional feature of the Conference has been the opportunity for municipal delegations to meet with ministry representatives, including ministers and senior staff, and opposition party leaders.

If opportunities for ministerial delegations are available, staff will lead the coordination and development of briefing materials to support discussions with relevant ministries.

#### 2. Ministerial Delegations

As in previous years, the Ministry of Municipal Affairs has notified municipalities of the ministerial delegation meeting request deadline and that not all requests will be accepted. This year's deadline is Tuesday July 3, 2018. These meetings usually last approximately 15 minutes.

Delegation meetings provide Regional Councillors and staff with opportunities to:

- Develop and/or strengthen relationships with Ministers, Parliamentary Assistants, opposition party leaders and their staff;
- Discuss important Regional Council advocacy initiatives with the provincial government and opposition party leaders:
- Promote the Region as an innovative and trusted partner to advance key provincial initiatives.

#### 3. Ministry Requests

If this year's AMO Annual Conference provides opportunities to meet with municipal delegations, these meetings will focus on the continued advancement of Regional Council's prioritized advocacy positions, the majority of which align to Term of Council Priorities.

Staff recommends delegation requests be made to the below list of Ministries/Ministers.

The Region is usually notified by Ministers' offices whether the delegation request has been accepted approximately one to two weeks prior the start of the AMO Conference. This may change with the new provincial government. If the opportunities exist, the Region will also work with local municipal partners to seek joint delegations where appropriate.

If meetings with Ministers are confirmed for this year's Conference, a briefing session will be scheduled in advance of the Conference for those Regional Councillors participating in the

delegation meetings. Staff will attempt to equalize participation among Council attendees based on areas of interest and local municipality.

#### 4. Additional Initiatives

Additional advocacy opportunities that will be pursued as part of the Region's process to prepare for the AMO's Annual Conference include:

- The Regional Chair sending a congratulatory letter to the successful Party Leader on behalf of Regional Council, which will outline the Region's advocacy priorities
- Hosting a meeting with all Peel-area Ministers/MPPs attending the Conference to discuss Peel-specific issues;
- Requesting individual delegation meetings with leaders of the opposition parties.

#### **CONCLUSION**

The Region of Peel has traditionally been an active participant in all aspects of the AMO Conference. The 2018 AMO Conference is particularly important as this may be the first major opportunity following the provincial election that Regional Councillors have to advance Regional priorities and build relationships with Ministers, Parliamentary Assistants, opposition party leaders and their staff.

Following the Conference, staff and the Chair of the Government Relations Committee will provide the Committee with an update on Conference activities and future opportunities to advance Regional priorities.

#### **OBJECTIVE**

To provide a summary of the work of the Government Relations Committee from 2015 to 2018.

#### REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- The Government Relations Committee has a mandate to lead the Region of Peel's advocacy efforts and build relationships with officials from other orders of government.
- The Committee met 10 times between 2015 and 2018 and received five delegations from provincial and federal government representatives.
- Committee members advanced advocacy priorities at delegation meetings held at the Association of Municipalities of Ontario annual conferences and through various other forums.
- In several cases, Peel's advocacy efforts, combined with those of the municipal sector, have been successful in bringing about positive change in areas of priority.

#### **DISCUSSION**

#### 1. Background

The Government Relations Committee (GRC) was established by Regional Council on January 15, 2015. The mandate of the GRC is to develop, coordinate, implement and monitor government relations strategies, based on Regional Council endorsed advocacy positions, with representatives from the provincial and federal governments and other stakeholders as appropriate.

The GRC has worked to fulfill this mandate by pursuing various advocacy initiatives to advance Regional priorities and by engaging with both provincial and federal elected officials.

#### 2. Government Relations Committee Meetings

The GRC met 10 times between 2015 and 2018. These meetings included 5 delegations from provincial and federal government representatives (titles reflect positions held at the time of the respective delegation):

- Sylvia Jones, Member of Provincial Parliament, Dufferin-Caledon, Infrastructure Critic and Deputy Leader, Ontario PC Party (Jun 15, 2017).

Delegations provided GRC members the opportunity to engage elected officials in discussions about provincial and federal government initiatives and shared priorities.

#### 3. Association of Municipality of Ontario (AMO) Annual Conferences

Over the last three years, members of the GRC played a leading role in delegation meetings at the annual AMO conferences. These meetings provide an important advocacy opportunity as GRC members are able to discuss Regional priorities in-person with Cabinet Ministers, ministry staff and opposition parties.

At the 2017 AMO Conference, GRC members met with the following officials:

- Minister of Environment and Climate Change
- Minister of Housing / Minister Responsible for the Poverty Reduction Strategy
- Minister of Infrastructure
- Minister of Municipal Affairs
- Minister of Transportation
- Ontario NDP Caucus

Members of the GRC will also be leading delegations at the 2018 AMO Conference. For more information, please see the report of the Commissioner of Corporate Services titled "2018 Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) Annual Conference".

#### 4. Strategic Initiatives

The GRC led various initiatives aimed at engaging other orders of government and advancing Peel's advocacy priorities.

#### a) 2015 Federal Election Strategy

In 2015, the GRC carried out a federal election strategy that focused on affordable housing, immigration, water and wastewater capacity, goods movement and transportation infrastructure. The Strategy included sending out information packages to federal candidates and raising public awareness through both traditional and social media.

#### b) Alignment of Advocacy Priorities to Region of Peel's Strategic Plan

In 2016, the GRC approved a new approach to Peel's advocacy work that brought greater alignment of advocacy priorities to Peel's Strategic Plan and Term of Council Priorities.

#### c) 2018 Provincial Election Strategy

The GRC implemented a strategy leading up to the provincial election on June 7, 2018. The strategy focused on the need for greater support from the provincial government to build and maintain local infrastructure. The Strategy included hosting a Peel MPP Candidate Forum and delivering a social media campaign.

#### d) MP/MPP Advocacy Updates

These newsletters draw attention to Peel's advocacy priorities and related initiatives. They are sent from the GRC to local Members of Provincial Parliament and Members of Parliament. In total, eight Advocacy Updates were sent out between 2015 and 2018.

#### 5. Progress on Advocacy Positions

There was positive progress on several advocacy priorities over the last three years. The following are a few examples.

#### a) Affordable Housing

The federal government has answered the call of the Region of Peel and other municipalities to develop a National Housing Strategy. It has also increased its commitment by providing additional funding.

#### b) Transportation and Goods Movement

The provincial government agreed to partner with the City of Mississauga and the Region of Peel to build a full interchange at Courtneypark Drive and Highway 410.

#### c) Waste Management

The provincial government responded to advocacy from Peel and the municipal sector to shift the cost of the Blue Box program to producers by passing the *Waste-Free Ontario Act*, 2016 and implementing the *Strategy for a Waste-Free Ontario: Building the Circular Economy*.

#### d) Environment and Climate Change

The Region of Peel has called for an increase in funding for transit infrastructure to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Through Phase 2 of the *Investing in Canada Plan*, the provincial and federal governments are taking action by providing up to \$15.1 billion in funding for public transit.

#### e) Provincial Ambulance Dispatch Reform

Provincial Ambulance Dispatch Reform – After years of advocating for reform, the province has committed to implementing a new triage tool at the Mississauga Central Ambulance Communication Centre.




