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Peel's Official Plan Review - An Opportunity for Action


- Peel's Regional Official Plan Review provides an opportunity for proactive action to consider where and how we will grow
- Advocate for land use planning as a health promotion strategy
- Use public health rationale to justify new policy (e.g., active design guidelines for affordable housing)



Why Does Health Matter?

- Growing body of evidence demonstrates the link between health and the built environment
- People want to live in environments that support healthy living:
 - Trails and bike paths
 - Pedestrian areas
 - Tree cover
 - Public open space

- Active transportation
- Proximity of amenities
- Human scale
- Age-friendly design
- How and where we grow will play a role in the health of Peel residents



Density and Urban Sprawl



Higher densities create demand for a broader variety of services, employment opportunities and transit within a closer walking distance.

Walkability

- Walkable communities promote health by making walking, cycling or public transit feasible and attractive modes of transportation
- Goal is to achieve a reasonable cluster of key services and employment opportunities to residences and transport nodes based on walking distance
- Need to ensure that a high incentive to walk is maintained through all seasons and weather conditions, across a reasonable range of physical abilities; the HDI suggests 500 to 800 metres (10 minute walk)



Community Services

Places to Grow defines Community Infrastructure as:

Lands, buildings and structures that support the quality of life for people and communities by providing public services for health, education, recreation, sociocultural activities, security and safety and affordable housing





Community Services

Need to consider:

- Density
- Access to services:
 - For example, child care centres
 - Active transportation
- Where services are located (possible co-location)
- Cultural appropriateness
