Conflict Resolution: Strategies



Wait and work through.

Apologize.

Ask them to stop.

Make a deal.

Talk it out.

Ask an adult for help.



Conflict Resolution: Steps Follow these steps to talk it out:

- 1 Identify the conflict what do we disagree about?
- 2 Listen to each other.
- 3 Speak calmly, using "I" statements to clarify.
- See the issue from multiple perspectives think about the disagreement from all sides.
- Try to stay calm until you have a solution where all sides feel their needs have been met.
