## Honouring Survivors, Building Awareness

With support from the Department of Justice Canada, Peel partners hosted a powerful community experience that featured a survivor photovoices exhibit, screening the film **Trafficked Voices** followed by a Survivor Leader Panel, and meaningful community engagement at the Hazel McCallion Central Library.

Inspired by Kintsugi—the Japanese art of repairing broken pottery with gold—this initiative symbolizes healing, strength, renewal, and the importance of honouring lived experience.
